<u>Speaker</u>

Terri Todd was our guest today and spoke about the non-profit her and her husband founded 16 months ago called Gratitude in Action (GIA) that (taken directly from their flyer) "helps people get off the street into a setting that promotes and encompasses much more than just the absence of alcohol and other

drugs. It promotes the attitude that a joyful and productive life is possible without alcohol or moodaltering drugs. They offer a safe, structured sober place to transition into a new way of living."

GIA offers a place to live (Ignatia's House) for chronic drug and alcohol abusers and also runs a thrift store to not only help alleviate poverty and improve the lives of families and individuals that will shop at the store but also provides the GIA tenants a place to work and provide job skills. GIA will come to your place and pick up items (gently used clothing, furniture, home décor, books and housewares) for donation to the store and items can also dropped off at 10 S. 30th between 10-6 M-F and 10-4 on Saturday.

Terry provided some pretty astonishing success statistics for their original group of eight tenants in terms of the numbers that have stayed sober, found jobs and reconnected with their children. Their initial success is far better than the average national recovery percentage that Terry attributes to providing a family like atmosphere and environment at Ignatia's House (named after a nun who worked at the Akron hospital during the period when AA was established) that allows tenants to recover and start living productive lives.

GIA is self-funded – the tenants pay rent – although donations of gift cards for undergarments, socks, hygiene and bedding products, bus passes and winter clothes are accepted. \$150 scholarships (1 person for 1 week) are also accepted.

GIA is holding a fundraising Gala at the Big Horn Resort on Nov. 9th with the theme "Baby it's Cold Outside" with cocktails and appetizers starting at 5:30 and dinner at 7 (yes cocktails – although Terry told us that 1 in 10 Americans suffer from drug or alcohol addition, the other 9 are OK to have a drink – in moderation of course). They will also have a silent auction (maybe a live auction as well?) with some nice items including a diamond ring and Broncos football tickets (maybe the Broncos will be playing someone good – wait, its Detroit . . . well a pro football game is fun regardless).
