Speakers

Abby Cook of MSUB spoke first about the Office of International Studies (OIS), which is the international leg of the college. Their goal is to internationalize the campus as well as the community with the objective of

- o broadening global learning,
- o creating bridges between the community, MSUB and the world.

The OIS obviously has an international curriculum that prepares students to compete on a global scale and offers study abroad programs that last a couple weeks to a year and, by the way, is open to community members. It should also be mentioned that study abroad is affordable as the students pay the same tuition elsewhere as they would pay at MSUB.

The OIS includes a Themed Semester Program that highlights a country/region for one semester and has included as many as 14 associated events (dinners, music, etc.) where most participants are community members.

The OIS includes BFFs, which in this case, stands for Billings Friendship Family, and connects a family with a foreign student – not in a living/host capacity, but rather short-term or longer term relationships where the family gets to know the student, their lives, their culture and visa versa, where the two can hang out and learn from each other and have fun.

Then we had a chance to hear from Monsee Luthra, a foreign student from India who spoke to us about her experiences at MSUB. Monsee is graduating this semester with an Associate Degree at City College and will continue her studies (3.9 GPA) to get a degree in Health and Human Performance. Although Monsee misses her food and family she always has someone to talk to and stays busy and engaged in the many clubs she's involved in including being a dorm RA. Her biggest challenge is funding her college education as there are not many scholarships available for foreign students and the \$17,000 tuition is about three times more expensive than local students due to the India to US exchange rate.
