## Speaker Summary

Julie and Ken Koerber spoke to us about the Off the Streets (OTS) shelter they run out of a couple rooms at the 4<sup>th</sup> Avenue Inn in downtown Billings. Ken is the Executive Director and Julie is the Community Outreach Director.

Founded by Craig Barthell in 2023, the shelter provides a sanctuary for chronically homeless people in a low-barrier facility – chronically meaning they rarely, if ever, have had roof over their heads – at least in the 3-year period; and low-barrier meaning there are very little rules associated with being able to stay nightly in the shelter versus other high-barrier facilities like the Montana Rescue Mission. Julie mentioned that in Billings alone, 600 people need a place to stay each night. Similar organizations provide shelter for a lot of these people, but beds for at least 80 more are needed.

In 2024, OTS helped 109 people with temporary housing at the 4<sup>th</sup> Avenue Inn. In this year alone, over 200 people have been served to date. Julie says their "secret sauce" to helping chronically homeless people is not trying to make huge immediate life improvements as this is too overwhelming for these folks. But rather, to make improvements measured in baby steps. OTS's goal is to help with the mental health and addiction issues their tenants have in a manner that ultimately finds them healthy, housed and with jobs. Women typically stay at the shelter for an average of 19 days and men 40 days.

OTS runs on a shoe-string budget – less than \$10K a month, of which rent uses 92%. The goal is to expand their housing and continue the classes and mentoring to improve the lives of their tenants. Their fund-raising efforts consist of exactly what they did for our group this morning as well as for other individuals who recognize the positive steps they are making for the people they serve and our community - in that they are focusing on educating us all about their mission and hoping grants and donations will follow.
